The church staff has been using this time to adequately prepare the building for these gatherings, prepare equipment for better online streaming, and fill you all in on what to expect. The reality is, all the COVID-related data is trending in the positive direction (positive meaning down!), but there are still cases. This means that we can resume meeting in person together, but that we must exercise wisdom and be responsible about it.

Below are some precautions we are taking, hopefully showing you what to expect on campus.

#### SUNDAY MORNING WORSHIP

- There will only be one entry/exit—the sanctuary doors, facing Lavista Road.
- When you arrive, a designated greeter will welcome you, scan your hand for your temperature, and ask you to use hand sanitizer.
- Masks will be required.





- The Gathering Room will be roped off, guiding you directly into the Sanctuary, so as to avoid the temptation to gather in groups, which we all so desire!
- Please enter the sanctuary building and find your seat upon arrival.
- At the conclusion of the service, we will dismiss everyone row by row, much like a wedding ceremony.
- You can place your offering in the boxes on your way in or out of the sanctuary building.

#### MAINSTREET KIDS

We're happy to announce that beginning **March** 7, when we return to corporate worship, we'll also be offering Mainstreet Kids for the littles! Hillary, our new Children's Ministry Director, has been working hard to prepare this ministry for return. We'll begin with one larger class, with the goal of breaking into 2 smaller classes based on age in the month or so to come.

When you and your child arrive, we will have you check in your child, answer a few brief COVID-related questions, and their temperature will be checked.

#### SUNDAY SCHOOL & MINISTRIES

For any **Sunday School class** meeting on campus, we simply ask that everyone wear a mask, and do their best to social distance. The Main Street Fellowship Hall provides ample space to spread out safely.



NTO will host a "Drive-thru" event on March 9th, as opposed to meeting totally in person, and will then host an in-person event in April, again observing all necessary safety protocols (i.e. temperature checks, masks, social distancing and limited reservation spots).

Our first **Core Seminar** will begin on **March 3**, **2021** and will be held on campus in the Main Street Fellowship Hall, from 6:00 pm - 7:30 pm, and will also be recorded and posted online for anyone who cannot

come in person. Again, masks will be required and there will be plenty of space to spread out and social distance.

Remember, the goal is to get back to meeting together in person. Therefore, we will all have to observe various policies and procedures that we may not love. But they are necessary for what we desire. We simply ask that if you come to worship or Sunday school, etc. in person that you joyfully observe the precautions we've put in place.

If you feel that you cannot come back safely at this point, that is ok! Please don't feel pres-sured. We will not shame anyone for choosing to stay home. Again, we are working to make improvements to the live streaming for you.

- SAFETY PROTOCOLS for meeting in person: Yes, this
  does seem like a long list of rules, but Covid-19 is still a
  very serious concern. We want to keep everyone safe, so,
  even if you have had the vaccine, we are asking you to
  follow these guidelines in order to attend the meetings.

If you are uncomfortable with these guidelines, we ask, WITH LOVE, that you postpone attending until these protocols are no longer required.

- 1. Reservations are required and are limited. (A maximum of 75 people is allowed in the building during the meeting; this includes NTO volunteers and kitchen staff.)
- 2. Remember that should you experience any of the following symptoms you should stay home: runny nose, fever, cough, headache, body aches, or sore throat.
- 3. Wear a mask, PROPERLY. This means wearing the mask to cover BOTH your mouth and your nose. You will need to wear your mask at all times, unless you are eating.
- 4. Temperatures will be taken at the door.
- 5. There will a sanitation station. Please sanitize your hands prior to entering the meeting space.
- 6. Stay at safe distances. Do not gather in crowds, however tempting it may be to fellowship with friends you have missed. Be mindful of crowding while waiting for the door to open. Stay six feet apart while in line waiting to pay. You are encouraged to have your conversations outside where it is safer.
- 7. Limit number of members at a table to 4.
- 8. Please be graceful if someone needs to remind you of these protocols.
- PRAYER: Please pray for all our members who are confined to home, in nursing homes, or ill or suffering long term health problems. Pray that we will be able to meet in safety and will soon be able to open our doors to all who want to attend.

#### **LENTON MESSAGE**

In many ways it feels like we've already been on a Lenten Journey for 341 days, and frankly, our community doesn't really need to be reminded of our mortality on Ash Wednesday as our community has experienced a lot of death and grief over the past several months. But, then again, maybe we need the ash cross to remind us of the hope of the end of the journey. Maybe we need to be reminded of the reality of death to truly embrace the hope and power of resurrection. For me, I cannot fully celebrate Easter without journeying through Lent. A wise woman once told me, "a Spring flower gives hope to Winter." I will add that Easter resurrection gives hope to Lent.


We meet on the third Thursday of each month. If you would like to join us, please get in touch with


The Healing Place has tentative plans to reopen on Monday,

as long as COVID cases continue in a downward trend. Previous precautions will still be in place: social distancing, masks, and hand sanitizing strongly encouraged.





"Hindus have many visible gods, and Sikhs have many gurus," said Shahid, who planted South Asian Community Church in Surrey, part of metro Vancouver. "In the midst of this complex situation, we are trying to help them to know, believe and receive Jesus Christ."

And over and over again, the Kamals see that transformation happens through prayer.

"Our prayer ministry is one of the successful connecting points," Shahid said. "Many came to our church for the very first time for prayer. They have specific prayer requests. And, praise God, God answered them and showed them that He's a living God."

# Loving a Diverse Community

DeKalb County, Georgia is a picture of diversity—and vast need.

There's a beautiful array of cultures but also brokenness. Many homes don't have dads in them. The abortion rate is high. There's division from racial and socioeconomic tensions.

When Ryan and Tricia moved their family to Atlanta to plant Gospel Hope Church, they wanted the congregation to reflect the multicultural community. To do that, Ryan worked with a diverse team of people who shared this vision.

But diversity isn't the ultimate goal, disciple making is. "The mission is to help those we come in contact with to take their next spiritual step and to be a church that loves all kinds of people, and let God bring all kinds of people."

"We believe the gospel brings hope to be reconciled to each other and to God," Ryan said.

# Finding Identity in Christ

Victor and Ludmila Moura were comfortable in Brazil. He was a pastor of a growing church, and she was a government lawyer doing well in her career. Over time, though, they felt God leading them in an unexpected direction—to plant a church for Brazilians in Boston, home to one of the largest immigrant populations in the U.S.

Their goal is for the new church, with services in both Portuguese and English, to be a place where those struggling to find their identity can find it in Christ.

Identity issues are a complex problem, especially among second- and third-generation Brazilians who feel they don't fit anywhere, Victor said. But the church's most powerful strategy is a simple one—community. Missional house groups are their greatest outreach opportunity.

"The Millennials, they hate superficial stuff," he said. "I think the most effective strategy to reach them is being a friend."

# A New Start for a Dying Church

Moving from Denver to a small town they had never heard of in Idaho was not in Anders' and Jessica's plans. But it fit where they felt the Holy Spirit was guiding them—to help a dying church come back to life and reach its community.

In 2018, they launched the replant of Calvary Church Nampa. The neighborhoods around the once-vibrant church are now aging and declining with a mix of Anglo and Hispanic residents. Drugs are a big problem—so are poverty and depression.

With a strategic outreach to get to know and serve their neighbors, the Snyders are seeing God move. More than 100 are now worshipping and growing in faith together.

"We're reclaiming ground that was already once won for the kingdom. It tells the story of a resurrected Christ in that the church can come back from the dead." Anders said.

# A Light in Darkness

Joshua Valdez says his city is a place of emotional and spiritual darkness. It's a melting pot of culture and religion. Its residents are mostly Hispanic and Navajo, and the Navajo are very much "a forgotten people," said Joshua, who also has both heritages.

The people have one common struggle—they often battle feelings of despair or worthlessness. He observes that as a church planter and at his job as an intervention specialist at a local high school.

"I see the hopelessness of the youth," he said. "Most of them are coming from really rough situations."

But many have grown to trust Joshua and visit his church plant, Higher Ground Church. During youth group gatherings there, he intentionally teaches the Bible verse by verse. Many are hearing it for the first time, and it's changing their lives.

## Picking Up the Pieces

Bobby and LaKeisha Williams have a simple goal—to meet the deep need of New Orleans with the even deeper love of Christ.

In the city, some buildings are still boarded up from Hurricane Katrina in 2005. The area around the Williamses' church plant is predominantly African American and low-income. "A lot of what we strive to do is provide resources," Bobby said. "We try to educate people spiritually, financially, intellectually, you name it."

That's how their church—Next Level Church—got its name. They want to see people take their life to the next level starting right where they are. The church provides its neighbors with multiple forms of assistance from health fairs to meal distribution, all with the goal of creating community and leading them to Jesus.

"Despite the challenges we've been able to make an impact, and we want to do even more," Bobby said.

# Reaching the "Lost Cause"

Jacob knows the homeless, drug addicts and gang members of Sanger. He used to live among them before he went to jail and met Jesus there.

Now he and his wife, Francine, are reaching those who "would scare people who go to most churches," Jacob said. Through Set Free Church, they take the gospel to the streets to reach the people others might see as a "lost cause."

Church members distribute food, hot meals and hygiene supplies several times a week along with an invitation to worship and Bible study. Their acts of compassion are growing the church and changing lives. Jacob also connects addicts with Biblically based recovery centers and continues their spiritual growth through Set Free Church's discipleship house.

All of it, Jacob said, "is God"—God gave him a heart to help those without hope "because I was there once myself."
